The Pastor's Page

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice; turn to the Lord and His strength; constantly seek His face.

Please continue to pray this week for our country, our Church, and for a fair election!

We thought that we would take this space to remind everyone of the important points that were made in last Sunday's homily instruction. There were several major points that should be kept in mind.

- A. Renew My Church is a program and a process by which each parish within the Archdiocese looks at itself to determine if it is vital and active enough to carry on its mission of sacraments, education, financial stability, and staff membership to continue to achieve three goals: to make disciples, to build community, and to inspire witness. In essence, do we have the structural and spiritual resources to carry on?
- B. We are in a grouping that includes St. Thomas More, St. Denis, and St. Bede the Venerable. It is within this grouping and its pastors and parish representatives that we meet and discern different scenarios for the future. Example; 1)St. Bede remains open and St. Denis and St. Thomas More come together as one parish. 2) St. Bede closes its school and all three parishes work together. These scenarios are fictitious and allow example of future possibilities.
- C. The course of Renew My Church runs from September 2020 to July 1, 2021. This time is for discernment, the presentation of various scenarios, taking surveys among the parishioners to include every parishioner's feedback, a written presentation to the Renew My Church Commission, which is then forwarded to the Archdiocese Presbyteral Council composed of priests and auxiliary bishops, and finally to the Cardinal's desk for a final decision.
- D. This will bring us to sometime in March. When the final scenario is announced, each parish will have until July 1, 2021 to inaugurate all relevant changes. This parishes that remain will combine and choose a new name. One parish will be named the canonical parish where all the records of the entire area will be kept.
- E. Please remember that no decisions have been made at this time. Our parish teams are still exploring various scenarios. We also must discuss staff arrangements, priest assignments (remember that one priest may be assigned for the whole area), building usage, repairs that may be needed to keep a church vital and active, and the coverage of languages needed like Spanish and Latin.
- F. The most important element of this whole operation is prayer. Please pray for us who are actively participating in the decision-making process, please pray for the members of all three parishes and pray that God will guide us to the very best scenario.

God bless you all and thank you for your prayers and patience in these matters.

ACT OF CONSECRATION OF THE HUMAN RACE TO THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS ON THE SOLEMN FEAST OF THE CHRIST THE KING

This prayer may be recited today, Oct. 25th, on the Feast of Christ our King (1962 Missale Romanum) for a Plenary Indulgence

Most sweet Jesus, Redeemer of the human race, look down upon us, humbly prostrate before Thy altar. We are Thine and Thine we wish to be; but to be more surely united with Thee, behold each one of us freely consecrates himself today to Thy Most Sacred Heart. Many indeed have nev-



er known Thee; many, too, despising Thy precepts, have rejected Thee. Have mercy on them all, most merciful Jesus, and draw them to Thy Sacred Heart. Be Thou King, O Lord, not only of the faithful who have never forsaken Thee; but also of the prodigal children who have abandoned Thee: grant that they may quickly return to their Father's house, lest they die of wretchedness and hunger. Be Thou King of those who are deceived by erroneous opinions, or whom discord keeps aloof, and call them back to the harbor of truth and unity of faith, so that soon there may be but one flock and one Shepherd. Be Thou King of all those who even now sit in the shadow of idolatry or Islam, and refuse not Thou to bring them into the light of Thy Kingdom. Grant, O Lord, to Thy Church, assurance of freedom and immunity from harm; give peace and order to all nations, and make the earth resound from pole to pole with one cry: Praise to the Divine Heart that wrought our salvation; to it be glory and honor forever. Amen.

INSTRUCTION ON INDULGENCES

The Code of Canon Law (can. 992) and the Catechism of the Catholic Church (n. 1471) state: "An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints." Thus, for a Catholic to gain an indulgence, he must fulfill the conditions given by the Church, and perform certain prescribed works.

To gain an indulgence (plenary or partial), the baptized Catholic, in communion with the Pope, and not excommunicated and not in schism, must be in the state of grace at least by the time the indulgenced work is completed. The faithful may gain one plenary indulgence daily. In order to obtain it, the faithful who are in the state of grace must: a) have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin; b) have sacramentally confessed their sins within several days; c) receive the Holy Eucharist (it is certainly better to receive it while participating in Holy Mass, but for the indulgence only Holy Communion is required); and d) pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff.

While it is not necessary, it is most fitting that the sacramental Confession, Holy Communion and the prayer for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff take place on the same day that the indulgenced work is performed; but it is sufficient that these sacred rites and prayers be carried out within several days (about 20) before or after the indulgenced act. The prayer for the Pope's intentions is left to the choice of the faithful, but an "Our Father," a "Hail Mary," and a "Glory be" are suggested. One sacramental Confession suffices for several plenary indulgences, but, for each plenary indulgence, a separate Holy Communion and a separate prayer for the Holy Father's intentions are required. For the sake of those legitimately impeded, confessors can commute both the work prescribed and the conditions required (except, obviously, detachment from even venial sin). Indulgences can always be applied either to oneself or to the souls in purgatory, but they cannot be applied to other persons living on earth.

THE GREATEST COMMANDMENT

A Meditation for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" (Matthew 22:36). This question was posed by one of the scholars of the law in an attempt to test Jesus. It's clear, from the context of this passage, that the relationship between Jesus and the religious leaders of His time was beginning to become contentious. They were beginning to test Him and were even trying to trap Him. However, Jesus continued to silence them with His words of wisdom. In response to the question above, Jesus silences this scholar of the law by giving the perfect answer. He says, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-39).

With this statement, Jesus gives a complete summary of the moral law found in the Ten Commandments. The first three Commandments reveal that we must love God above all and with all our might. The last six Commandments reveal that we must love our neighbor. The moral law of God is as simple as fulfilling these two more general commandments. But is it all that simple? Well, the answer is both "Yes" and "No." It's simple in the sense that God's will is not typically complex and difficult to comprehend. Love is spelled out clearly in the Gospels and we are called to embrace a radical life of true love and charity.

However, it can be considered difficult in that we are not only called to love, we are called to love with all our being. We must give of ourselves completely and without reserve. This is radical and requires that we hold nothing back. Reflect, today, upon the simple call to love God and your neighbor with all that you are. Reflect, especially, upon that word "all." As you do, you will most certainly become aware of ways in which you fail to give everything. As you see your failure, recommit in hope to the glorious path of making a total gift of yourself to God and others.

Lord, I choose to love You with my whole heart, mind, soul and strength. I also choose to love all people as You love them. Give me the grace to live these two commandments of love and to see them as the path to holiness of life. I do love You, dear Lord. Help me to love You more. Jesus, I trust in You.

QUAS PRIMAS

A Meditation for the Feast of Christ our King

BACKGROUND

The celebration of the Feast of Christ the King was originally instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI in a declaration called Quas Primas. At the time of its institution, secularism was on the rise, and many Christians doubted Christ's authority and even His Christ's existence. 1925 witnessed the rise of dictatorships in Europe, and saw many Christians taken in by these earthly leaders. The celebration of Christ the King was instituted during a time when respect for Christ. The Pope hoped that the annual celebration of Christ the King would work toward the accomplishment of the following: (1) That nations would see that the Church has the right to freedom, and immunity from the state. (2) That leaders and nations would see that they are bound to give respect to Christ. (3) That the faithful would gain strength and courage from the celebration, as we are reminded that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies. The goals of this celebration are still very much needed today, as these problems have not vanished, but instead have worsened. In a chaotic and unjust world that seems to scorn any kind of authority, we celebrate Christ the King, that He might rule over our hearts, our minds, our wills; over our families, our society, and over the whole universe.

A Meditation for the Feast of Christ our King

MEDITATION

A certain king was very rich. His power was known throughout the world. But he was most unhappy, for he desired a wife. Without a queen, the vast palace was empty. One day, while riding through the streets of a small village, he saw a beautiful peasant girl. So lovely was she that the heart of the king was won. He wanted her more than anything he had ever desired. On succeeding days, he would ride by her house on the mere hope of seeing her for a moment in passing. He wondered how he might win her love. He thought, I will draw up a royal decree and require her to be brought before me to become the queen of my land. But, as he considered, he realized that she was a subject and would be forced to obey. He could never be certain that he had won her love. Then, he said to himself, "I shall call on her in person. I will dress in my finest royal garb; wear my diamond rings, my silver sword, my shiny black boots, and my most colorful tunic. I will overwhelm her and sweep her off her feet to become my bride."

But, as he pondered the idea, he knew that he would always wonder whether she had married him for the riches and power he could give her. Then, he decided to dress as a peasant, drive to the town, and have his carriage let him off. In disguise, he would approach her house. But, somehow the duplicity of this plan did not appeal to him. At last, he knew what he must do. He would shed his royal robes. He would go to the village and become one of the peasants. He would work and suffer with them. He would actually become a peasant. This he did. And he won his wife. So did God consider how He might win humankind. God in Christ became one of us. He took upon Him the form of human flesh to dwell among us. Paul says, "God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself."
